

Vertex makes billion-dollar bet on Fan Pier site

Vertex Pharmaceuticals has signed a \$1.1 billion, 15-year lease to move its the lease includes a 10-year headquarters from Cambridge to South Boston's waterfront — a big boost for Hub Mayor Thomas M. Menino's planned "Innovation District."

Vertex said yesterday that it's finalized a \$72.5 million-a-year lease for 1.1 million square feet of office and lab space at South Boston's Fan Pier complex.

Plans call for the firm to consolidate all 1,300 of its employees out of 10 Camby using a \$71.8 million bridge sites and into two package of state- and localplanned Fan Pier buildings in late 2013 or early 2014.
